Subject: Discontinuance of Saudi Arabian Trade Discrimination Against US Jewish Firms.

You will recall that Senator Lehman ² and Congressmen Javits ³ and Celler ⁴ have made inquiries of the Department on behalf of certain of their constituents ⁵ regarding the Saudi Arabian ban on imports from US firms under Jewish control or ownership. Efforts by the Department and the Embassy in Jidda have recently been successful in causing the Saudi Arabian Government to discontinue this discriminatory practice. Reference Jidda Embassy telegram no. 629 dated April 30 (Tab 1). ⁶

It is suggested that you might wish to inform the Senator and Congressmen that such is the case and letters have accordingly been drafted to them for your signature (Tabs 2, 3 and 4).
